The regular meeting of the Lakeside Union School District Board of Trustees was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Lara Hoefer Moir, Vice President, with the following members present: Jim Bennett, Clerk; Autumn Ellenson, Member; and Ron Kasper, Member. He thanked the parents, teachers and auxiliary staff that makes these promotions happen.

Vice President Hoefer Moir commented on the many activities this month. She attended the Jr. Fair; Festival of the arts; Latin performances at Lakeview; LMS FFA banquet; guitar concert; and promotions. She gave a big thank you to the maintenance department and custodial staff for the set up at the rodeo grounds. The promotions looked beautiful.

Committee membership is mandated by the State for all districts who have bonds. She reported that we are just about depleted of all the bond funds. The majority of the projects have been completed.

H. 1. Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Natalie Winspear, presented the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP). We are completing year 2 of a 3-year plan. The goals and outcomes were thoroughly discussed. Dr. Winspear explained the data results. She was pleased with the positive growth. The input process consisted of a ThoughtExchange where 989 students and 46 staff participated. There was lots of great input and suggestions. Some challenges we're facing are student attendance, sub teacher shortages, adopting outdated curriculum, limited inclusion for students with special needs, more training for classified staff, and student behavior.

At 5:25 p.m. Vice President Hoefer Moir opened a public hearing to receive input regarding the 2023-24 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) prior to the final adoption on June 22, 2023, as required by Education Code §52062. Hearing no comments, the Vice President closed the hearing.

2. Assistant Superintendent, Lisa Davis, presented the 2023-24 proposed budget. The budget is with the Governor now and will be adopted by June 30. We have volatile revenues this year. We are a heavy tax-dependent state and the key issue is that the Governor postponed the income tax deadline to October. Another key area of concern is that California is losing more residents than it is gaining at all income levels. The Governor is proposing a 8.22% COLA; universal meals; home-to-school transportation; etc. We are still in good shape, but we need to act with prudence in regards to the budget.

At 5:52 p.m. Vice President Hoefer Moir opened a public hearing to receive input regarding the 2023-24 Proposed Budget prior to the final adoption on June 22, 2023 as required by Education Code §52062. Hearing no comments, the Vice President closed the hearing.

President Hayes thanked everyone for their work on the promotions. Each one was spectacular and the kids and families were happy. The venue was awesome.

Annual Barona Presentation

F. 1. Julie Cushman, Principal of Barona Indian Charter School, presented the annual report to the Board. She introduced her staff and her Board members, along with the Chairman Mr. Ray Welch. She commented that enrollment was down this year, they ended with 82 students. They continue to cap class enrollment at 16 for grades K-2 and 24 for grades 3-8. The students showed a lot of growth this year on the MAPS tests. The attendance rate ended with 91.3%. They are proud of their Leader in Me program; the budget; National School Lunch Program; Summer Impact Program; Community outreach; and so much more.

Annual River Valley Presentation

2. Seth Phelps, TOSA for River Valley Charter School, presented the annual report to the Board. He commented that their enrollment has been low due to the pandemic, but are in a good place to start to grow again. They are getting out into the community to advertise. The ADA is holding strong at 98.5%, which is always a struggle for an independent study school. The school is working at a net loss this school year, using their reserves for what they were meant for. River Valley offers 18:1 in the classroom; a hybrid independent study; sports; Prom; dances; etc. They are involved in community engagement such as working at the Octoberfest, Trunk or Treat, Western Days and La Mesa Flag day parades, and so much more.

F. PRESENTATIONS (CONTINUED)

3. Michelle Perkins, Coordinator of Education Services, presented information on our District vision and future actions for English Learners support. She reported that we had 421 EL's this school year, an increase from previous years. The number has been steadily rising over the past few years. 70% are Spanish speakers and most are U.S. citizens, but they all are diverse and unique. This year we reviewed and strengthened the reclassification process; built knowledge of exiting students; purchased ELL compliance software; modified the LCAP ELL professional development plan; increased awareness and communication; and increased family engagement.

English Learners Presentation

4. Beverly Jimenez, Coordinator of Education Services, presented information on the Local Control and Accountability Plan Local Indicators. There are 8 state priorities and 5 local indicators. Our local indicators are basic conditions; implementation of standards of curriculum; parent and family engagement; school climate; and access to a broad course of study. She thoroughly explained each one and answered clarifying questions.

AGREEMENT PROVIDING FOR THE USE OF CLINICAL FACILITIES

This agreement is entered into this **July 1st, 2023** by and between the **GROSSMONT-CUYAMACA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT** (on behalf of GROSSMONT COLLEGE), 8800 Grossmont College Drive, El Cajon, CA 92020, hereinafter called the "District", **and LAKESIDE UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**, 12355 Woodside Avenue, Lakeside, CA 92040 hereinafter called "Facility".

The District has received approval from its Governing Board to conduct programs in **NURSING PROGRAM** education. In order to properly conduct such programs, on-the-job training experiences are required. It is of mutual benefit to the parties that students in said program use the clinical facilities of the Facility for their learning experience.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

The term of this Agreement shall extend from **July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2026**, unless either party hereto subscribing requests modification or serves notice of termination. Said request or notice shall be established by written notification, sent by certified mail, three months prior to the termination date.

2. NONDISCRIMINATION

The Facility shall not discriminate against any student on the basis of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, handicap, medical condition, age, veteran status, or marital status, in the use of its facilities.

3. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FACILITY

The Facility agrees to accept, for clinical experiences, students of the District in a number to be agreed upon between District and Facility. The Facility agrees to specify the responsibilities and authority of the facility's staff as related to the program and to the educational experience of the students in order to ensure safe and continuous health care services to the patients.

4. PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS

(a) CPR Certification

The District shall require that the students successfully complete Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) certification prior to their clinical participation at Facility.

(b) Physical Examination

The District shall require that the students undergo a physical examination within six (6) months prior to their acceptance into the Allied Health and Nursing program.

The District shall require that students undergo TB testing, which, if positive, will be followed with a chest X-ray to exclude the possibility of active tuberculosis according to the CDC guidelines and provide evidence of current

immunizations. In addition, the District shall require that students present evidence of up-to-date immunizations, including T-dap booster, annual influenza, Varicella, MMR and Hepatitis B with blood titer.

5. BACKGROUND CHECK

The District shall require that all students must submit to and complete a background check by Grossmont College. The District shall also require a background check and drug screen completed through American Databank prior to beginning an assignment.

6. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DISTRICT

The District will furnish an Allied Health and Nursing faculty member who will be accountable for the students while at the Facility and will also be responsible for planning and coordinating the activities of said students with the appropriate designated Facility preceptor during the student's clinical experience. The Allied Health and Nursing faculty member will also be responsible for the assessment and evaluation of said students.

The District shall furnish a description of responsibilities of faculty assigned to the facility. Provisions for continuing communication between the Facility and the program will be provided by the Allied Health and Nursing faculty member.

7, STATUS OF STUDENTS

The students shall be considered LEARNERS and shall not replace Facility staff or give service to patients apart from its educational value. The students shall not be considered employees of the Facility for any purpose whatsoever.

The Facility shall have provisions for orientation for the students and faculty prior to beginning an assignment at the Facility.

During clinical assignment, the students have the responsibility to comply with the same administrative policies as Facility employees in matters relating to the welfare of patients.

The Facility may refuse educational access to the clinical area to any person from the District who does not meet the Facility's standards of safety, health or ethical behavior.

There is no liability of the Facility for any acts or omissions of students or District.

8. MEALS

If a cafeteria is on the premises, the students shall be given the privilege of eating in the Facility's cafeteria and to purchase their meals at employee prices.

9. SUPPLIES

The Facility shall make available, for educational purposes, rooms or areas where groups of students may hold discussions and receive clinical instructions.

The Facility shall permit the educational use of supplies and equipment commonly available for patient care, including sources of information for educational purposes.

10. LIABILITY STATUS

- (a) The District shall carry commercial general liability insurance with a limit of liability of at least \$5,000,000 per occurrence covering faculty members and students of the District during assignment in the Facility. A certificate of insurance shall be provided to Facility as evidence of such coverage.
- (b) The District shall carry Workers' Compensation insurance with a limit of liability of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence covering faculty and students of the District during assignment in the Facility. A certificate of insurance shall be provided to Facility as evidence of such coverage.
- (c) The student shall carry professional malpractice insurance with a limit of liability of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence, and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate. The District will verify that the student has an insurance certificate on file.

11. INDEMNIFICATION

- (a) Facility shall defend, indemnify and hold District, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorney's fees or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of Facility, its officers, agents or employees.
- (b) The District shall defend, indemnify and hold Facility, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees), or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorney's fees, or claims or injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of District, its officers, agents, or employees.
- (c) No acts or omissions of Facility with respect to students or District shall be a basis for indemnity by Facility or District.

12. COOPERATION AND DISPOSITION OF CLAIMS

The District and Facility agree to cooperate with each other in the investigation and disposition of third party liability claims arising out of any services provided under this Agreement or in the operation of the program. It is the intention of the parties to fully cooperate in the disposition of all such claims. Such cooperation may include joint investigation, defense and disposition of claims of third parties arising from services performed under this Agreement. District and Facility agree to inform one another whenever an incident report is filed or when an investigation is initiated concerning any professional service performed under this Agreement. To the extent allowed by law, including without limitation any applicable privileges, District and Facility shall have reasonable access to the medical records and charts of the other relating to any such claim or investigation; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall require either District or Facility to disclose any peer review documents, records or communications which are privileged under Section 1157 of the California Evidence Code, under the attorney/client privilege or under the attorney/work product privilege.

13. CONFIDENTIALITY OF RELATIONSHIPS WITH PATIENTS

Prior to the commencement of clinical training pursuant to this Agreement, the District will instruct its students regarding the confidentiality of all communications with the patients and between the patients, their doctors, and Facility staff. In addition, they shall be instructed that it is a breach of ethics and contrary to State law to divulge to any person not directly connected with the program, the names of persons being treated at the Facility and the nature of their illness.

AMENDMENT TO THE EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE LAKESIDE UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT AND RHONDA TAYLOR, Ed.D.

The Governing Board of the Lakeside Union School District of San Diego County, California (hereinafter referred to as the "Board") and Rhonda Taylor, Ed.D. (hereinafter referred to as ("Superintendent") agree to amend the Employment Agreement between the Governing Board of the Lakeside Union School District and Rhonda Taylor, Ed.D. (hereinafter "Agreement") and to enter into this Amendment to the Agreement between the Governing Board of the Lakeside Union School District and Rhonda Taylor, Ed.D. (hereinafter "Amendment") on following terms and conditions:

1. The following provision shall replace Paragraph 1, (Term), of the Agreement:

1. <u>TERM</u>

The Board hereby employs the Superintendent for a period of three years, commencing July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2026.

Upon satisfactory ("meets expectations") evaluation of the Superintendent on or before the first regularly scheduled Board meeting in June of each school year, the Board shall meet with the Superintendent prior to June 30 of that same school year to discuss whether to offer the Superintendent a one-year extension to the remainder of the Agreement term. If an extension is offered, it shall be memorialized as a written addendum to this Agreement.

- 2. With the exception of the above modifications, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 3. The Superintendent and the Board agree that this Amendment is not binding or enforceable unless it is ratified in by the Board in an open session meeting of the Board.

CONSULTING/PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

LAKESIDE UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT AND SCOTT BARNETT

THIS AGREEMENT for consulting/professional services is made by and between

Lakeside Union School District ("District"), a public school district formed and operating pursuant to the laws of the State of California located at 12335 Woodside Avenue, Lakeside, CA, 92040,

and

Scott Barnett an individual operating pursuant to the laws of the State of California, whose primary place of business is located at 7770 Regents Road, 113-286, San Diego, CA, 92122 ("Consultant/Professional") (together sometimes referred to as the "Parties") as of July 14, 2023. ("Effective Date").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 53060 grants school districts the authority to contract with and employ persons for the furnishing of special services to such districts, if such persons are specially trained, experienced and competent to perform the special services requested; and

WHEREAS, Consultant/Professional is specially trained and possesses the skills, experience, education, competency, licenses and/or credentials necessary to perform the required services; and

WHEREAS, the services performed under this Agreement not funded in whole or in part by any state or federal grant; and

WHEREAS, District does not employ persons with sufficient expertise to perform the required services.

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

<u>SECTION 1: SERVICES</u>. Subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, Consultant/Professional shall provide to District the services described in the Scope of Work/Services at **Exhibit A**, attached and incorporated by reference, at the time and place and in the manner specified therein. In the event of a conflict in or inconsistency between the terms of this Agreement and **Exhibit A**, the Agreement shall prevail except provisions relating to payment.

- 1.1 <u>Term.</u> The term of this Agreement shall begin on June 15, 2023 and shall end on June 30, 2024, which includes Phase I and additional phases, unless terminated by the District. Consultant/Professional shall complete the work described in **Exhibit A** as Phase I within 45 days of the date of this agreement unless the term of this Agreement is otherwise terminated or extended, as provided in Section 8. The time provided to Consultant/Professional to complete the services required by this Agreement shall not affect the District's right to terminate the Agreement, as provided in Section 8.
- 1.2 <u>Professional Skill.</u> The Parties mutually agree that District is relying upon the professional skill of the Consultant/Professional as a specialist in the work as described in Exhibit A. Acceptance of the Consultant/Professional's work by District does not operate as a release of Consultant/Professional's representations. It is intended that Consultant/Professional's work shall conform to normal standards of accuracy, completeness.

- 1.3 <u>Standard of Performance</u>. Consultant/Professional shall perform all services required pursuant to this Agreement in the manner and according to the standards observed by a competent practitioner of the profession in which Consultant/Professional is engaged in the geographical area in which Consultant/Professional practices its profession. Consultant/Professional shall prepare all work products required by this Agreement in a substantial, first-class manner and shall conform to the standards of quality normally observed by a person practicing in Consultant/Professional's profession.
- 1.4 <u>Assignment of Personnel</u>. Consultant/Professional shall assign only competent personnel to perform services pursuant to this Agreement. In the event that District, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this Agreement, desires the reassignment of any such persons, Consultant/Professional shall, immediately upon receiving notice from District of such desire of District, reassign such person or persons.
- **1.5** Time. Consultant/Professional shall devote such time to the performance of services pursuant to this Agreement as may be reasonably necessary to meet the standard of performance provided in Section 1.3 above and to satisfy Consultant/Professional's obligations.

SECTION 2: COMPENSATION. District agrees to pay the Consultant/Professional a sum not-to-exceed Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for Phase I as shown on Exhibit B, notwithstanding any contrary indications that may be contained in Consultant/Professional's proposal, for services to be performed and any permitted reimbursable costs incurred under this Agreement. In the event of a conflict between this Agreement and Consultant/Professional's proposal, regarding the amount of compensation, the Agreement shall prevail. District shall pay Consultant/Professional for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement at the time and in the manner set forth herein. The payments specified herein shall be the only payments from District to Consultant/Professional for services rendered pursuant to this Agreement. Consultant/Professional shall invoices to District in the manner specified herein. Except as specifically authorized by District, Consultant/Professional shall not bill District for duplicate services performed by more than one person.

Consultant/Professional and District agree that compensation paid by District to Consultant/Professional under this Agreement is based upon Consultant/Professional's estimated costs of providing the services required hereunder, including salaries and benefits of employees and subcontractors of Consultant/Professional. Consequently, the Parties further agree that compensation hereunder is intended to include the costs of contributions to any pensions and/or annuities to which Consultant/Professional and its employees, agents, and subcontractors may be eligible. District therefore has no responsibility for such contributions beyond compensation required under this Agreement.

- **2.1** <u>Invoices.</u> Consultant/Professional shall submit invoices upon completion of services performed to **Phase I** and the below contact. Invoices shall contain the following information:
 - Beginning and ending dates of the billing period;
 - A task summary containing the original contract amount, the balance due, a brief description of the work completed.
 - Consultant/Professional's signature.
- 2.2 Payments. As Shown in Exhibit B, the District shall pay the total sum due pursuant to this Agreement within 30 days after completion of the services and submittal to District of a final invoice, if all services required have been satisfactorily performed.

- **2.3** Reimbursable Expenses. Reimbursable expenses, if any, shall not exceed the total amount of compensation provided under this Agreement.
- **2.4** Payment of Taxes. Consultant/Professional is solely responsible for the payment of any applicable federal, state, or local taxes incurred under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Payment upon Termination</u>. In the event that District terminates this Agreement pursuant to Section 8, District shall compensate the Consultant/Professional for all outstanding costs incurred for work satisfactorily completed as of the date of written notice of termination. Consultant/Professional shall maintain adequate logs and timesheets in order to verify costs incurred to that date.
- **2.6** <u>Authorization to Perform Services</u>. The Consultant/Professional is not authorized to perform any services or incur any costs whatsoever under the terms of this Agreement until receipt of authorization from the District Representative.

SECTION 3. FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT. Except as set forth herein, Consultant/Professional shall, at its sole cost and expense, provide all facilities and equipment that may be necessary to perform the services required by this Agreement.

SECTION 4. INDEMNITY AND DEFENSE. To the fullest extent allowed by law, Consultant/Professional will indemnify, defend, and hold harmless District, its Board of Education members, officers, agents, employees and directors (hereinafter "Indemnified Parties") from and against any claim, demand, loss or liability (hereinafter "Claim") of any nature or cause whatsoever, and whether actual or alleged, arising from or in any way connected with the performance of this Agreement, including, but not limited to any Claim for personal injury, death, property damage, loss of profits, infringement upon intellectual property rights, failure to comply with all of the requirements contained in Education Code section 45125.1 and/or disclosure of confidential information which might be obtained by Consultant/Professional during performance of this Agreement; except where such Claim is caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnified Parties.

- 5.1 Selection of Defense Counsel. If any action or proceeding, whether judicial, administrative, arbitration or otherwise, shall be commenced on account of any claim, demand or liability covered by this Agreement, and such action or proceeding names any of the Indemnified Parties as a party thereto, the Consultant/Professional shall, at its sole cost and expense, defend the Indemnified Parties in such action or proceeding with counsel reasonably satisfactory to the Indemnified Parties named in such action or proceeding.
- 5.2 Payment of Judgment. In the event that there shall be any judgment, award, ruling, settlement, or other relief arising out of any such action or proceeding to which any of the Indemnified Parties are bound by, Consultant/Professional shall pay, satisfy, or otherwise discharge any such judgment, award, ruling, settlement, or relief and shall indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties from any and all liability or responsibility arising out of any such judgment, award, ruling, settlement, or relief.
- 5.3 Indemnification Limitations. The foregoing obligation(s) of Consultant/Professional shall not apply when (1) the injury, loss of life, damage to property, or violation of law arises wholly from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of District or its officers, employees, agents, or volunteers; and (2) the actions or omissions of Consultant/Professional or its employees, subcontractors, or agents have contributed in no part to the injury, loss of life, damage to property, or violation of law. The duty of Consultant/Professional to indemnify and hold harmless includes the duty to defend as set forth in California Civil Code section 2778. Acceptance by District of insurance certificates and endorsements required under this Agreement does not relieve Consultant/Professional from liability under this indemnification and hold harmless clause shall apply to any damages or claims for damages whether or not such insurance policies shall have been determined to apply. Consultant/Professional agrees that its indemnification and defense obligations are a material element of consideration in this Agreement.
- 5.4 <u>Liability for Employment Related Obligations</u>. In the event that Consultant/Professional or any of its employees, agents, or subcontractors providing services under this Agreement is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction, the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS), or the California State Teachers Retirement System to be eligible for enrollment as an employee of District, Consultant/Professional shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless District for the payment of any employee and/or employer contributions for such retirement benefits on behalf of Consultant/Professional or its employees, agents, or subcontractors, as well as for the payment of any penalties and interest on such contributions, which would otherwise be the responsibility of District.
- 5.5 <u>Civil Code Exclusions</u>. Notwithstanding the forgoing, to the extent this Agreement is a "construction contract" as defined by California Civil Code section 2782, as may be amended from time to time, such duties of Consultant/Professional to indemnify shall not apply when to do so would be prohibited by California Civil Code section 2782.
- Tender of Indemnity and Defense. The Consultant/Professional's obligation to indemnify and defend shall not be excused because of the Consultant/Professional's inability to evaluate liability or because the Consultant/Professional evaluates liability and determines that the Consultant/Professional is not liable to the claimant. The Consultant/Professional must respond within 30 days to the tender of any claim for indemnity and defense by the District. If the Consultant/Professional fails to accept or reject a tender of defense and indemnity within

30 days, in addition to any other remedy authorized by law, money otherwise due the Consultant/Professional under and by virtue of this Agreement, as shall reasonably be considered necessary by the District, may be retained by the District until disposition has been made of the claim or suit for damages, or until the Consultant/Professional accepts or rejects the tender of defense, whichever occurs first.

5.7 Survival. The terms of this Section 5 shall survive termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 6. STATUS OF CONSULTANT/PROFESSIONAL.

- 6.1 Independent Contractor. At all times during the term of this Agreement, Consultant/Professional shall be an independent contractor and shall not be an employee of District. District shall have the right to control Consultant/Professional only insofar as the results of Consultant/Professional's services rendered pursuant to this Agreement and assignment of personnel pursuant to subparagraph 1.4. Except as expressly provided in this section 6.1, District shall not have the right to control the means by which Consultant/Professional accomplishes services rendered pursuant to this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other District, state, or federal policy, rule, regulation, law, or ordinance to the contrary, Consultant/Professional and any of its employees, agents, and subcontractors providing services under this Agreement shall not qualify for or become entitled to, and hereby agree to waive any and all claims to, any compensation, benefit, or any incident of employment by District, including but not limited to, eligibility to enroll in the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS)(or other defined benefit employee retirement plans) as an employee of District and entitlement to any contribution to be paid by District for employer contributions and/or employee contributions for PERS or other benefits.
- 6.2 <u>Consultant/Professional No Agent.</u> Except as District may specify in writing, Consultant/Professional shall have no authority, express or implied, to act on behalf of District in any capacity whatsoever as an agent. Consultant/Professional shall have no authority, express or implied, pursuant to this Agreement to bind District to any obligation whatsoever.

SECTION 7. LEGAL REQUIREMENTS.

- 7.1 Governing Law. The laws of the State of California shall govern this Agreement.
- 7.2 Compliance with Applicable Laws, Rules, and Regulations. Consultant/Professional and any subcontractors shall comply with all laws, rules, regulations, and requirements applicable to the performance of the work hereunder, which include but are not limited to those relating to health and safety, that may be amended from time to time.
- 7.3 Other Governmental Regulations. To the extent that this Agreement may be funded by fiscal assistance from another governmental entity, Consultant/Professional and any subconsultant(s) shall comply with all applicable rules and regulations to which District is bound by the terms of such fiscal assistance program.
- 7.4 <u>Licenses and Permits</u>. Consultant/Professional represents and warrants to District that Consultant/Professional and its employees, agents, and any subcontractors have all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required to practice their respective professions. Consultant/Professional represents and warrants to District that it and its employees, agents, any subconsultant(s) shall, at their sole cost and expense, keep in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement any licenses, permits, and approvals that are legally required to practice their respective professions.
- 7.5 <u>Nondiscrimination and Equal Opportunity</u>. Consultant/Professional shall not discriminate, on the basis of a person's race, religion, color, national origin, age, physical or mental handicap or disability, medical condition, marital status, sex, or sexual orientation, against any employee, applicant for employment, subcontractor, bidder for a subcontract, or participant in, recipient of, or applicant for any services or programs provided by

Consultant/Professional under this Agreement. Consultant/Professional shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, policies, rules, and requirements related to equal opportunity and nondiscrimination in employment, contracting, and the provision of any services that are the subject of this Agreement, including but not limited to the satisfaction of any positive obligations required of Consultant/Professional.

Consultant/Professional shall include the provisions of this subsection in any subcontract approved by the District Representative or this Agreement.

- **7.6** <u>Electronic Signature</u>. Consultant/Professional consents to conducting transactions for this Agreement via electronic signature, which will have the same validity and effect as a signature affixed by hand, through an electronic system established and maintained by the <u>District.__SB /__(Initials)</u>.
 - 7.6.1 Under the Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (California Civil Code sections 1633.1-1633.17), Consultant/Professional agrees to conduct transactions relating to the Agreement by use of an electronic signature, which is an electronic mark that is held to the same standard as a legally binding equivalent of my handwritten signature. Consultant/Professional further agrees that, for the purposes of authorizing, approving, and authenticating records, information, and transactions relating to this Agreement, the electronic signature has the full force and effect of a signature affixed by hand to a paper document. Consultant/Professional agrees that the transactions conducted electronically relating to this Agreement shall be binding upon it.
 - 7.6.2 Consultant/Professional agrees that the electronic signature will be valid from date of issuance until the end of the Agreement term or earlier if it is revoked or terminated under this Agreement. Consultant/Professional understands that the District may suspend, terminate, or revoke the electronic signature in its reasonable discretion.
 - 7.6.3 Consultant/Professional will use the electronic signature to establish identity and sign electronic documents and forms relating to the Agreement and Amendments. Consultant/Professional is solely responsible for protecting the electronic signature. If Consultant/Professional suspects or discovers that the electronic signature has been stolen, lost, used by an unauthorized party, or otherwise compromised, then Consultant/Professional will immediately notify the Strategic Sourcing and Contracts Officer or his/her designee and request that the electronic signature be revoked. Consultant/Professional will then immediately cease all use of the electronic signature. Consultant/Professional agrees to keep the electronic signature secret and secure by taking reasonable security measures to prevent it from being lost, modified, or otherwise compromised, and to prevent unauthorized disclosure of, access to, or use of it or of any media on which information about it is stored.

SECTION 8. TERMINATION AND MODIFICATION.

- 8.1 Termination. District may terminate this Agreement, without cause, upon thirty (30) days' written notice to Consultant/Professional. In the event of termination, Consultant/Professional shall be entitled to compensation for services performed to the effective date of termination; District, however, may condition payment of such compensation upon Consultant/Professional delivering to District any or all documents, photographs, computer software, video and audio tapes, and other materials provided to Consultant/Professional or prepared by or for Consultant/Professional or the District in connection with this Agreement.
- **8.2** Extension. District may, in its sole and exclusive discretion, extend the end date of this Agreement beyond that provided for in subsection 1.1. Any such extension shall require a written amendment to this Agreement.
- **8.3** Amendments. The Parties may amend this Agreement only by in writing signed by all the Parties and approved by District's governing board.
- **8.4** Assignment and Subcontracting. The Parties agree that this Agreement contemplates personal performance by Consultant/Professional and is based upon a determination of Consultant/Professional's unique personal competence,

experience, and specialized personal knowledge. Moreover, a substantial inducement to District for entering into this Agreement was and is the professional reputation and competence of Consultant/Professional. For these reasons, Consultant/Professional may not assign this Agreement or any interest therein without the prior written approval of the District Representative. Consultant/Professional shall not subcontract any portion of the performance contemplated and provided for herein, other than to the subcontractors noted in the proposal, without prior written approval of the District Representative.

- **8.5** Survival. All obligations arising prior to the termination of this Agreement and all provisions of this Agreement allocating liability between District and Consultant/Professional shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- **8.6** Options upon Breach by Consultant/Professional. If Consultant/Professional materially breaches any of the terms of this Agreement, District's remedies shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - Immediately terminate the Agreement;
 - Retain the plans, specifications, drawings, reports, design documents, and any other work product prepared by Consultant/Professional pursuant to this Agreement.
 - Retain a different Consultant/Professional to complete the work described in Exhibit A not finished by Consultant/Professional; and/or
 - Charge Consultant/Professional the difference between the cost to complete the work described in Exhibit A
 that is unfinished at the time of breach and the amount that District would have paid Consultant/Professional in
 Exhibit B, pursuant to Section 2 if Consultant/Professional had completed the work.

SECTION 9. KEEPING AND STATUS OF RECORDS.

- 9.1 Records Created as Part of Consultant/Professional's Performance. All reports, data, maps, models, charts, studies, surveys, photographs, memoranda, plans, studies, specifications, records, files, or any other documents or materials, in electronic or any other form, that Consultant/Professional prepares or obtains pursuant to this Agreement and that relate to the matters covered hereunder shall be the property of the District. Consultant/Professional agrees to deliver those documents to the District upon termination of the Agreement. The documents and other materials, including but not limited to those described above, prepared pursuant to this Agreement are prepared specifically for the District and are not necessarily suitable for any future or other use. The Parties agree that, until final approval by District, all data, plans, specifications, reports and other documents are confidential and will not be released to third parties without prior written consent of both Parties unless required by law.
- 9.2 <u>Consultant/Professional's Books and Records</u>. Consultant/Professional shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services or expenditures and disbursements charged to District under this Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to the Consultant/Professional under this Agreement.
- 9.3 Inspection and Audit of Records. Any records or documents that Section 9.2 of this Agreement requires Consultant/Professional to maintain shall be made available for inspection, audit, and/or copying at any time during regular business hours, upon oral or written request of District. Under California Government Code section 8546.7, if the amount of public funds expended under this Agreement exceeds TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00), the Agreement shall be subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor, at the request of District or as part of any audit of the District, for a period of three (3) years after final payment under the Agreement.

SECTION 10. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- 10.1 <u>Attorneys' Fees.</u> If a party to this Agreement brings any action, including an action for declaratory relief, to enforce or interpret a provision of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorneys' fees in addition to any other relief. The court may set such fees in the same action or in a separate action brought for that purpose.
- 10.2 <u>Venue</u>. If a court of competent jurisdiction finds or rules that any provision of this Agreement is invalid, void, or unenforceable, the provisions of this Agreement not so adjudged shall remain in full force and effect. The invalidity in whole or in part of any provision of this Agreement shall not void or affect the validity of any other provision of this Agreement.
- **10.4** No Implied Waiver of Breach. The waiver of any breach of a specific provision of this Agreement does not constitute a waiver of any other breach of that term or any other term of this Agreement.

- **10.5** <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall apply to and bind the successors and assigns of the Parties.

Consultant/Professional represents and warrants that it is not now, nor has it been in the previous twelve (12) months, an employee, agent, appointee, or official of the District in the previous twelve months, Consultant/Professional was an employee, agent, appointee, or official of the District in the previous twelve months, Consultant/Professional represents and warrants that it did not participate in any manner in the forming of this Agreement. Consultant/Professional understands that if this Agreement is or was made in violation of Government Code § 1090 et seq. the entire Agreement is void and Consultant/Professional will not be entitled to any compensation for services performed pursuant to this Agreement, including reimbursement of expenses, and Consultant/Professional will be required to reimburse the District for any sums paid to the Consultant/Professional. Consultant/Professional understands that, in addition to the foregoing, it may be subject to criminal prosecution for a violation of Government Code § 1090 and, if applicable, will be disqualified from holding public office in the State of California.

Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 0450: Comprehensive Safety Plan

Background (Describe purpose/rationale of the agenda item):

Adoption: Policy updated to clarify language related to approval of the tactical response plan and add material regarding the district's requirement to provide data to the California Department of Education pertaining to lockdown or multi-option response drills conducted at district schools.

Administrative Regulation - Comprehensive Safety Plan Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (SB 906, 2022) which requires, starting with the 2023-24 school year, districts to include in the annual notification to parents/guardians information related to the safe storage of firearms, and for certificated and classified employees of the district, and other school officials such as Governing Board members, whose duties bring the employee or other school official in contact on a regular basis with students in any of grades 6-12, as part of a middle school or high school, who are alerted to or observe any threat or perceived threat of a homicidal act, to immediately report the threat or perceived threat to law enforcement. Regulation also updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1352, 2021) which authorizes districts to request the Military Department, in consultation with the California Cybersecurity Integration Center (Cal-CSIC), to perform an independent security assessment of the district or an individual district school and NEW LAW (AB 2355, 2022) which requires districts that experience a cyberattack, which impacts more than 500 students or personnel, to report the cyberattack to Cal-CSIC. Additionally, regulation updated to include in the optional list of comprehensive safety plan components (1) strategies aimed at preventing potential incidents involving crime and violence on school campuses, (2) provision of safety materials and emergency communications in language(s) understandable to parents/guardians, (3) procedures for the early identification and threat assessment of, and appropriate response to, suspicious and/or threatening digital media content, (4) district policy and/or plan related to pandemics, (5) communication with parents/guardians regarding unification plans and necessity of cooperating with first responders, and (6) continuity of operations procedures to ensure that the district's essential functions are not disrupted during an emergency, to the extent possible.

COMPREHENSIVE SAFETY PLAN

The Governing Board recognizes that students and staff have the right to a safe and secure campus where they are free from physical and psychological harm. The Board is fully committed to maximizing school safety and to creating a positive learning environment that includes strategies for violence prevention and high expectations for student conduct, responsible behavior, and respect for others.

The school site council at each district school shall develop a comprehensive school safety plan relevant to the needs and resources of that particular school. New school campuses shall develop a safety plan within one year of initiating operations. (Education Code 32281, 32286)

The school safety plan shall take into account the school's staffing, available resources, and building design, as well as other factors unique to the site.

The comprehensive safety plan(s) shall be reviewed and updated by March 1 of each year and forwarded to the Board for approval. (Education Code 32286, 32288)

The Board shall review the comprehensive safety plan(s) in order to ensure compliance with state law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall approve the plan(s) at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Tactical Response Plan

Notwithstanding the process described above, any portion of a comprehensive safety plan that addresses tactical responses to criminal incidents that may result in death or serious bodily injury at the school site, including steps to be taken to safeguard students and staff, secure the affected school premises, and apprehend the criminal perpetrator(s), shall be developed by district administrators in accordance with Education Code 32281. In developing such strategies, district administrators shall consult with law enforcement officials and with a representative(s) of employee bargaining unit(s), if they chooses to participate.

When reviewing the tactical response plan, the Board may meet in closed session to confer with law enforcement officials and approve the tactical response plan, provided that any vote to approve the tactical response plan is announced in open session following the closed session. (Education Code 32281)

Safety Plan(s) Access and Reporting

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that an updated file of all safety-related plans and materials is readily available for inspection by the public. (Education Code 32282)

However, those portions of the comprehensive safety plan that include tactical responses to criminal incidents shall not be publicly disclosed.

The Superintendent or designee shall share the comprehensive safety plans and any updates to the plans with local law enforcement, the local fire department, and other first responder entities. (Education Code 32281)

The Superintendent or designee shall also provide data to CDE pertaining to lockdown or multioption response drills conducted at district schools in accordance with Education Code 32289.5. (Education Code 32289.5)

COMPREHENSIVE SAFETY PLAN

Development and Review of Comprehensive School Safety Plan

The school site council shall consult with local law enforcement, the local fire department, and other first responders in the writing and developing of the comprehensive school safety plan. When practical, the school site council shall also consult with other school site councils and safety planning committees. (Education Code 32281, 32282)

The school site council may delegate the responsibility for developing a comprehensive safety plan to a school safety planning committee composed of the following members: (Education Code 32281)

- 1. The principal or designee
- 2. One teacher who is a representative of the recognized certificated employee organization
- 3. One parent/guardian whose child attends the school
- 4. One classified employee who is a representative of the recognized classified employee organization
- 5. Other members, if desired

Before adopting its comprehensive safety plan, the school site council or school safety planning committee shall hold a public meeting at the school in order to allow members of the public the opportunity to express an opinion about the plan. (Education Code 32288)

The school site council or safety planning committee shall notify, in writing, the following persons and entities of the public meeting: (Education Code 32288)

- 1. A representative of the local school employee organization
- 2. A representative of each parent/guardian organization at the school, including the parent teacher association and parent teacher clubs
- 3. A representative of each teacher organization at the school
- 4. A representative of the school's student body government
- 5. All persons who have indicated that they want to be notified

In addition, the school site council or safety planning committee may notify, in writing, the following entities of the public meeting: (Education Code 32288)

1. Representatives of local religious organizations

- 2. Local civic leaders
- 3. Local business organizations

Content of the Safety Plan

Each comprehensive safety plan shall include an assessment of the current status of school crime committed on campus and at school-related functions. (Education Code 32282)

The assessment may include, but not be limited to, data on reports of school crime, suspension and expulsion rates, and surveys of students, parents/guardians, and staff regarding their perceptions of school safety.

The plan shall identify appropriate strategies and programs that will provide or maintain a high level of school safety and address the school's procedures for complying with existing laws related to school safety, including all of the following: (Education Code 32282)

- 1. Child abuse reporting procedures consistent with Penal Code 11164-11174.3
- 2. Routine and emergency disaster procedures including, but not limited to:
 - a. Adaptations for students with disabilities in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act
 - b. An earthquake emergency procedure system in accordance with Education Code 32282
 - c. A procedure to allow public agencies, including the American Red Cross, to use school buildings, grounds, and equipment for mass care and welfare shelters during disasters or other emergencies affecting the public health and welfare
- 3. Policies pursuant to Education Code 48915(d) for students who commit an act listed in Education Code 48915(c) and other school-designated serious acts that would lead to suspension, expulsion, or mandatory expulsion recommendations
- 4. Procedures to notify teachers of dangerous students pursuant to Education Code 49079
- 5. A policy consistent with the prohibition against discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying pursuant to Education Code 200-262.4
- 6. If the school has adopted a dress code prohibiting students from wearing "gang-related apparel" pursuant to Education Code 35183, the provisions of that dress code and the definition of "gang-related apparel"
- 7. Procedures for safe ingress and egress of students, parents/guardians, and employees to and from school
- 8. A safe and orderly school environment conducive to learning

- 9. The rules and procedures on school discipline adopted pursuant to Education Code 35291 and 35291.5
- 10. Procedures for conducting tactical responses to criminal incidents, including procedures related to individuals with guns on campus and at school-related functions

Among the strategies for providing a safe environment, the comprehensive safety plan may also include:

- 1. Development of a positive school climate that promotes respect for diversity, personal and social responsibility, effective interpersonal and communication skills, self-esteem, anger management, and conflict resolution
- 2. Disciplinary policies and procedures that contain prevention strategies, such as strategies to prevent bullying, hazing, and cyberbullying, as well as behavioral expectations and consequences for violations
- 3. Strategies aimed at preventing potential incidents involving crime and violence on school campuses, including vandalism, drug and alcohol abuse, gang membership and violence, hate crimes, bullying, including bullying committed personally or by means of an electronic act, teen relationship violence, and discrimination and harassment, including sexual harassment
- 4. Curriculum that emphasizes prevention and alternatives to violence, such as multicultural education and literacy, character/values education, social and emotional learning, media analysis skills, conflict resolution, community service learning, and education related to the prevention of dating violence
- 5. Parent/guardian involvement strategies, including strategies to help ensure parent/guardian support and reinforcement of the school's rules and increase the number of adults on campus
- 6. Provision of safety materials and emergency communications in language(s) understandable to parents/guardians
- 7. Annual notification to parents/guardians related to the safe storage of firearms
- 8. Prevention and intervention strategies related to the sale or use of drugs and alcohol which shall reflect expectations for drug-free schools and support for recovering students
- 9. Collaborative relationships among the county, community agencies, local law enforcement, the judicial system, and the schools that lead to the development of a set of common goals and community strategies for violence prevention instruction
- 10. District policy prohibiting the possession of firearms and ammunition on school grounds
- 11. Measures to prevent or minimize the influence of gangs on campus

- 12. Procedures for receiving verification from law enforcement that a violent crime has occurred on school grounds and for promptly notifying parents/guardians and employees of that crime
- 13. Procedures for the early identification and threat assessment of, and appropriate response to, suspicious and/or threatening digital media content
- 14. Assessment of the school's physical environment, including a risk management analysis and development of ground security measures such as procedures for the closing campuses to outsiders, installing surveillance systems, securing the campus perimeter, protecting buildings against vandalism, and providing for a law enforcement presence on campus
- 15. Independent security assessment of the school's network infrastructure and selected web applications to identify vulnerabilities and provide recommendations to improve cybersecurity
- 16. Guidelines for the roles and responsibilities of mental health professionals, athletic coaches, community intervention professionals, school counselors, school resource officers, and police officers on school campuses. Guidelines may include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. Strategies to create and maintain a positive school climate, promote school safety, and increase student achievement
 - b. Strategies to prioritize mental health and intervention services, restorative and transformative justice programs, and positive behavior interventions and support
 - c. Protocols to address the mental health care of students who have witnessed a violent act at any time, including, but not limited to, while on school grounds, while coming or going from school, during a lunch period whether on or off campus, or during or while going to or coming from a school-sponsored activity
- 17. Strategies for suicide prevention and intervention
- 18. District policy and/or plan related to pandemics
- 19. Procedures to implement when a person interferes with or disrupts a school activity, remains on campus after having been asked to leave, or creates a disruption with the intent to threaten the immediate physical safety of students or staff
- 20. Crisis prevention and intervention strategies, which may include the following:
 - a. Identification of possible crises that may occur, determination of necessary tasks that need to be addressed, and development of procedures relative to each crisis, including the involvement of law enforcement and other public safety agencies as appropriate

- b. Threat assessment strategies to determine the credibility and seriousness of a threat and provide appropriate interventions for the potential offender(s)
- c. Assignment of staff members responsible for each identified task and procedure
- d. Development of an evacuation plan based on an assessment of buildings and grounds and opportunities for students and staff to practice the evacuation plan
- e. Coordination of communication to schools, Governing Board members, parents/guardians, and the media
- f. Communication with parents/guardians of reunification plans and the necessity of cooperating with first responders
- g. Development of a method for the reporting of violent incidents
- h. Development of follow-up procedures that may be required after a crisis has occurred, such as counseling
- 21. Training on assessment and reporting of potential threats, violence prevention, and intervention techniques. Such training shall include preparation to implement the elements of the safety plan
- 22. Environmental safety strategies, including, but not limited to, procedures for preventing and mitigating exposure to toxic pesticides, lead, asbestos, vehicle emissions, and other hazardous substances and contaminants
- 23. Continuity of operations procedures to ensure that the district's essential functions are not disrupted during an emergency, to the extent possible

LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN

The Governing Board desires to ensure the most effective use of available funding to improve outcomes for all students. A comprehensive, data-driven planning process shall be used to identify annual goals and specific actions which are aligned with the district budget and facilitate continuous improvement of district practices.

The Board shall adopt a districtwide local control and accountability plan (LCAP), based on the template adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE), that addresses the state priorities in Education Code 52060 and any local priorities adopted by the Board. The LCAP shall be updated on or before July 1 of each year and, like the district budget, shall cover the next fiscal year and two subsequent fiscal years. (Education Code 52060, 52064; 5 CCR 15494-15497)

The LCAP shall focus on improving outcomes for all students, particularly those who are "unduplicated students" or are part of any numerically significant student subgroup that is at risk of or is underperforming.

Unduplicated students include students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, English learners, and foster youth as defined in Education Code 42238.01 for purposes of the local control funding formula (LCFF). (Education Code 42238.02)

Numerically significant student subgroups include ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, foster youth, and homeless students, when there are at least 30 students in the subgroup or at least 15 foster youth or homeless students. (Education Code 52052)

The Superintendent or designee shall review the school plan for student achievement (SPSA) submitted by each district school pursuant to Education Code 64001 to ensure that the specific actions included in the LCAP are consistent with strategies included in the SPSA. (Education Code 52062)

The LCAP shall also be aligned with other district and school plans to the extent possible in order to minimize duplication of effort and provide clear direction for program implementation.

As part of the LCAP adoption and annual update to the LCAP, the Board shall separately adopt an LCFF budget overview for parents/guardians, based on the template developed by the SBE, which includes specified information relating to the district's budget. The budget overview shall be adopted, reviewed, and approved in the same manner as the LCAP and the annual update. (Education Code 52064.1)

Any complaint that the district has not complied with legal requirements pertaining to the LCAP may be filed pursuant to AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures. (Education Code 52075)

Plan Development

The Superintendent or designee shall gather data and information needed for effective and meaningful plan development and present it to the Board and community. Such data and information shall include, but not be limited to, data regarding the numbers of students in student subgroups, disaggregated data on student achievement levels, and information about current programs and expenditures.

The Board shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other school personnel, employee bargaining units, parents/guardians, and students in developing the LCAP. Consultation with students shall enable unduplicated students and other numerically significant student subgroups to review and comment on LCAP development and may include surveys of students, student forums, student advisory committees, and/or meetings with student government bodies or other groups representing students. (Education Code 52060; 5 CCR 15495)

Public Review and Input

The Board shall establish a parent advisory committee to provide advice on the LCAP. The committee shall be composed of a majority of parents/guardians and shall include parents/guardians of unduplicated students as defined above and parents/guardians of students with disabilities. (Education Code 52063; 5 CCR 15495)

Beginning July 1, 2025, if the district is identified by the California Department of Education (CDE) as needing an improvement plan pursuant to 34 CFR 300.600-300.647, the Board shall adopt, and update on an annual basis, an Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Addendum, based on the template adopted by SBE. However, if the district adopts an improvement plan after being identified, but before July 1, 2025, the IDEA Addendum shall be developed upon expiration of the adopted improvement plan, but no later than July 1, 2028, whichever occurs first. The IDEA addendum shall be developed, reviewed, and approved in conjunction with and in the same manner as the LCAP and the annual update to the LCAP, and shall be submitted to CDE within 15 days of adoption by the Board. (Education Code 52064.3)

Whenever district enrollment includes at least 15 percent English learners, with at least 50 students who are English learners, the Board shall establish an English learner parent advisory committee composed of a majority of parents/guardians of English learners to review and comment on the LCAP. (Education Code 52063; 5 CCR 15495)

The Superintendent or designee shall present the LCAP to the committee(s) before it is submitted to the Board for adoption, and shall respond in writing to comments received from the committee(s).

The Superintendent or designee shall notify members of the public of the opportunity to submit written comments regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The notification shall be provided using the most efficient method of notification possible, which may not necessarily include producing printed notices or sending notices by mail. All written notifications related to the LCAP shall be provided in the primary language of parents/guardians when required by Education Code 48985. (Education Code 52062)

As part of the parent/guardian and community engagement process, the district shall solicit input on effective and appropriate instructional methods, including, but not limited to, establishing language acquisition programs to enable all students, including English learners and native English speakers, to have access to the core academic content standards and to become proficient in English. (Education Code 305-306)

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with the administrator(s) of the special education local plan area of which the district is a member to ensure that specific actions for students with disabilities are included in the LCAP and are consistent with strategies included in the annual assurances support plan for the education of students with disabilities. (Education Code 52062)

The Board shall hold at least one public hearing to solicit the recommendations and comments of members of the public regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The public hearing shall be held at the same meeting as the budget hearing required pursuant to Education Code 42127 and AR 3100 - Budget. (Education Code 42127, 52062)

Adoption of the Plan

The Board shall adopt the LCAP prior to adopting the district budget, but at the same public meeting. This meeting shall be held after the public hearing described above, but not on the same day as the hearing. (Education Code 52062)

The Board may adopt revisions to the LCAP at any time during the period in which the plan is in effect, provided the Board follows the process to adopt the LCAP pursuant to Education Code 52062 and the revisions are adopted in a public meeting. (Education Code 52062)

Submission of Plan to County Superintendent of Schools

Not later than five days after adoption of the LCAP, the district budget, and the LCFF budget overview for parents/guardians, the Board shall file the LCAP, the budget, and the budget overview with the County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 42127, 52064.1, 52070)

If the County Superintendent sends, by August 15, a written request for clarification of the contents of the LCAP, the Board shall respond in writing within 15 days of the request. If the County Superintendent then submits recommendations for amendments to the LCAP within 15 days of receiving the Board's response, the Board shall consider those recommendations in a public meeting within 15 days of receiving the recommendations. (Education Code 52070)

If the County Superintendent does not approve the district's LCAP, the Board shall accept technical assistance from the County Superintendent focused on revising the plan so that it can be approved. (Education Code 52071)

Monitoring Progress

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually in accordance with the timeline and indicators established by the Superintendent and the Board, regarding the district's progress toward attaining each goal identified in the LCAP. Evaluation shall include, but not be limited to, an assessment of district and school performance reported on the California School Dashboard. Evaluation data shall be used to recommend any necessary revisions to the LCAP.

The Superintendent or designee shall seek and/or accept technical assistance or other intervention that may be required pursuant to Education Code 52071 or 52072 when a school or a numerically significant student subgroup is not making sufficient progress toward the goals in the LCAP.

The extent to which students have access to and are enrolled in a broad course of study that includes all of the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable, including the programs and services developed and provided to unduplicated students and students with disabilities, and the programs and services that are provided to benefit these students as a result of supplemental and concentration funding pursuant to Education Code 42238.02 and 42238.03
- h. Student outcomes, if available, in the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable
- 2. Any goals identified for any local priorities established by the Board.
- 3. BEFORE/AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

The Governing Board desires to provide before-school and/or after-school enrichment programs that support the regular education program in a supervised environment. In order to increase academic achievement of participating students, the content of such programs shall be coordinated with the district's vision and goals for student learning, local control and accountability plan, curriculum, and academic standards.

The district's program shall be planned through a collaborative process that includes parents/guardians, students, and representatives of participating schools, governmental agencies including city and county parks and recreation departments, local law enforcement, community organizations, and, if appropriate, the private sector. (Education Code 8422, 8482.5, 46120)

To the extent feasible, the district shall give priority to establishing before-school and/or after-school programs in low-performing schools and/or programs that serve low-income and other at-risk students.

Any After School Education and Safety Program (ASES), 21st Century Community Learning Center Program (21st CCLC), 21st Century High School After School Safety and Enrichment for Teens Program (ASSETs), or other program to be established pursuant to Education Code 8421, 8482.3 or 8484.75 shall be approved by the Board and the principal of each participating school.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff who directly supervise students in the district's before-school and/or after-school program possess appropriate knowledge and experience. As needed, staff and volunteers shall receive ongoing training related to their job responsibilities.

Each program shall include academic and enrichment elements in accordance with law and administrative regulation. In addition, each program may include support services that reinforce the educational component and promote student health and well-being.

A family fee may be charged to participating families based on the actual cost of services.

For ASES, 21st CCLC, and/or Expanded Learning Opportunities programs, no fee shall be charged for a student who is eligible for free or reduced-price meals, or a student who the district knows is a homeless youth or in foster care. In addition, family fees shall be calculated on a sliding scale that considers family income and ability to pay. (Education Code 8482.6, 46120)

Eligible students who are 11 or 12 years of age shall be placed in a before-school or after-school program, if and when available, rather than subsidized child care and development services. During the time that the before-school or after-school program does not operate, such students may be provided the option of enrolling in child care and development services in accordance with the enrollment priorities established in AR 5148 - Child Care and Development. (Welfare and Institutions Code 10273)

The Board and the Superintendent or designee shall monitor student participation rates and shall identify multiple measures that shall be used to evaluate program effectiveness. Such measures may include, but are not limited to, student outcome data; program self-assessments; feedback from staff, participating students, and parents/guardians; and observations of program activities.

Every three years, the Superintendent or designee shall review the after-school program plan, including, but not limited to, program goals, program content, and outcome measures. Documentation of the program plan shall be maintained for a minimum of five years.

BEFORE/AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Definitions

Expanded learning opportunities means before school, after school, summer, or vacation, and/or intersessional learning programs that focus on developing the academic, social, emotional, and physical needs and interests of students through hands-on, engaging learning experiences. Expanded learning opportunities does not mean an extension of instructional time, but rather, opportunities to engage students in enrichment, play, nutrition, and other developmentally appropriate activities. (Education Code 8482.1, 46120)

Offer access, with regard to an Expanded Learning Opportunities (ELO) program, means to recruit, advertise, publicize, or solicit through culturally and linguistically effective and appropriate communication channels. (Education Code 46120)

Provide access, with regard to an ELO program, means to register or enroll a student in an ELO program. (Education Code 46120)

Unduplicated student means a student enrolled in a district who is either classified as an English learner, eligible for a free or reduced-price meal, or is a foster youth. (Education Code 42238.02, 46120)

Grades TK-8

The district's After School Education and Safety (ASES) program or 21st Century Community Learning Center (21st CCLC) program shall serve students in grades TK-8 as the district may determine based on local needs. (Education Code 8482.3, 8484.7, 8484.75, 8484.8)

The district's 21st CCLC program(s) shall primarily serve students in Title I schoolwide programs (Education Code 8484.8; 20 USC 7173)

The district's ELO program shall serve students in grades TK-6. (Education Code 46120)

The district's programs shall be planned through a collaborative process that includes parents/guardians, students, and representatives of participating schools, governmental agencies, including city and county parks and recreation departments, local law enforcement, community organizations, and the private sector. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may include other stakeholders in such collaborative process. (Education Code 8482.5, 8484.75, 46120)

For the 2022-23 school year, the district shall offer access to ELO programs to all unduplicated students in grades TK-6 and provide access to such programs to at least 50 percent of enrolled unduplicated students. (Education Code 46120)

The district shall offer access to the ELO program to all classroom-based unduplicated students in grades TK-6. The district shall provide access to any unduplicated student whose parent/guardian requests placement in an ELO program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the plan to provide access to full-day learning programs the year before kindergarten addresses the needs of children and their families as specified in BP 6170.1 - Transitional Kindergarten. (Education Code 8281.5)

The district's ASES, 21st CCLC, and ELO program(s) shall be operated in accordance with the following:

1. Program Elements

- a. The program shall include an educational and literacy element in which tutoring or homework assistance is provided in language arts, mathematics, history and social science, computer training, and/or science. (Education Code 8482.3, 8484.75, 46120)
- b. The program shall include an educational enrichment element which may include, but is not limited to, fine arts, career technical education, recreation, physical fitness, and prevention activities. (Education Code 8482.3, 8484.75, 46120)

2. Nutrition

- a. Snacks or meals made available in the program shall conform to state nutrition standards specified in Education Code 49430-49434; or 42 USC 1766 as applicable. (Education Code 8482.3, 8484.75, 46120; 42 USC 1766-1766a; 7 CFR 226.17))
- b. The district's before-school program shall offer a breakfast meal as described in Education Code 49553 for all program participants. (Education Code 8483.1, 8484.75)

3. Location of Program

- a. The program may be offered at one or multiple school sites and/or at an easily available and accessible off-campus facility. (Education Code 8482.3, 8484.75)
- b. When there is a significant barrier to student participation in either the before-school or after-school component of a program at the school of attendance, the Superintendent or designee may, with the approval of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, provide services at another school site. Such transfer of services shall occur only if the school to which the program will be transferred agrees to receive students from the transferring school and has an existing grant of the same type as the transferring school, or does not have a 10-percent lower percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-price meals than the transferring school. A significant barrier includes either of the following: (Education Code 8482.8)
 - (1) Fewer than 20 students participating in the program component

- (2) Extreme transportation constraints, including, but not limited to, desegregation busing, busing for magnet or open enrollment schools, or student dependence on public transportation
- (3) A reduction in the program grant of an existing school due to its merging into a new school opened by the district or the splitting of its students with a new school

In such cases, the district shall arrange for safe, supervised transportation between school sites; ensure communication among staff in the regular school program, staff in the before-school or after-school program, and parents/guardians; and ensure alignment of the educational and literacy elements with the regular school program of participating students. (Education Code 8482.8, 8484.75)

4. Staffing

- a. All staff members who directly supervise students shall, at a minimum, meet the qualifications for an instructional aide. (Education Code 8483.4, 8484.75, 45330, 45344, 45344.5)
- b. All program staff and volunteers shall be subject to the health screening and fingerprint clearance requirements in law and Board policy. (Education Code 8483.4, 8484.75)
- c. The student-to-staff ratio shall be no more than 20 to 1, except that programs serving transitional kindergarten or kindergarten students shall maintain a student-to-staff member ratio of no more than 10 to 1. (Education Code 8483.4, 8484.75, 46120)

5. Hours of Operation

- a. A before-school program shall not operate for less than one and one-half hours per regular school day. (Education Code 8483.1, 8484.75)
- b. An after-school program shall begin immediately upon the conclusion of the regular school day and shall operate a minimum of 15 hours per week and at least until 6 p.m. on every regular school day. (Education Code 8483, 8484.75)
- c. An ELO program shall provide in-person before or after school expanded learning opportunities that, when added to daily instructional minutes, shall not be less than nine hours of combined instructional time and expanded learning opportunities per instructional day. (Education Code 46120)

6. Admissions

a. Every student attending a school operating a program is eligible to participate in the program, subject to program capacity. (Education Code 8482.6, 8484.75)

- b. If the number of students wishing to participate in the program exceeds program capacity, selected for enrollment based on the following guidelines:
 - (1) First priority for enrollment shall be given to students who are identified as homeless youth, as defined by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC 11434a), at the time they apply for enrollment or at any time during the school year, to students who are identified by the program as being in foster care, and to students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. (Education Code 8483, 8483.1, 8484.75)

The district is not required to disenroll a current student in order to secure the enrollment of a student who has priority for enrollment. (Education Code 8483, 8483.1)

The district shall inform the parent/guardian of a homeless or foster youth, or student eligible for free or reduced price meals, of the right of the child to receive priority enrollment and how to request priority enrollment. (Education Code 8483, 8484.75)

- (2) Second priority for enrollment of middle or junior high school students shall be given to students who attend daily. (Education Code 8483, 8483.1, 8484.75)
- (3) Third priority for enrollment shall be given to students identified as in need of academic remediation or support in accordance with Board policy or administrative regulation.
- (4) Any remaining capacity shall be filled by students selected at random.
- (5) A waiting list shall be established to accommodate additional students if space becomes available.

7. Attendance/Early Release

- a. Each student admitted into a district program shall be expected to attend the full number of hours that the program is in operation every day that the student participates. An ELO program offered pursuant to Education Code 46120 does not have an attendance requirement, but the district may track student attendance for safety and continuous quality improvement purposes.
- b. When necessary, a student's parent/guardian may request, in writing, that the Superintendent or designee approve the reasonable late daily arrival for the before-school program or the reasonable early daily release from the after-school program. The Superintendent or designee shall not approve such a request if the student would be attending less than one-half of the daily program hours.

8. Summer/Intersession/Vacation Programs

- a. ELO programs shall offer no less than nine hours of in-person expanded learning opportunities per day for at least 30 non-school days, during intersessional periods.
- b. A before-school program operating during summer, intersession, and/or vacation days shall be offered for a minimum of two hours per day. An after-school program offered during summer, intersession, and/or vacation days may be operated for either three hours or six hours per day in accordance with Education Code 8483.76. When both before-school and after-school programs are offered for the same students on such days, they shall be operated for a minimum of four and one-half hours per day. (Education Code 8483, 8483.1, 8483.2, 8483.76)
- c. A program offered during summer, intersession, and/or vacation periods may open eligibility to every student attending a school in the district, with priority for enrollment given to students enrolled in the school that received the grant. (Education Code 8483.76)
- d. To address the needs of students and school closures, the program may be conducted at an off-site location or an alternate school site. The program shall notify the California Department of Education (CDE) of the change of location and shall include a plan to provide safe transportation pursuant to Education Code 8484.6. (Education Code 8483.76)
- e. Any program operating for six hours per day shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate free or reduced-price meal to each eligible student during each program day. (Education Code 8483.76)
- f. For any program operating six hours per day, district procedures pertaining to student attendance and early release as specified in item #7 above shall apply. (Education Code 8483.76)

Reports

The Superintendent or designee shall annually submit to CDE outcome-based data, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 8427, 8482.3, 8484)

- 1. For participating students!, school day attendance on an annual basis and program attendance on a semi-annual basis
- 2. Evidence of a program quality improvement process that is data driven and based on CDE program quality standards

GUIDANCE/COUNSELING SERVICES

The Governing Board recognizes that a structured, coherent, and comprehensive counseling program promotes academic achievement and growth, and serves the diverse needs of district students. The district shall provide an educational counseling program that offers students services and supports within a Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) framework, in accordance with law. Counseling staff shall be available to provide students with individualized reviews of their educational progress toward academic and/or career and vocational goals and, as appropriate, may discuss social, personal, or other issues that may impact student learning and well-being.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all persons employed to provide direct school counseling, school psychology, school social work services to students, and/or implement equitable school programs and services that support students' academic and social emotional development and college and career readiness shall possess the appropriate credential from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing authorizing their employment in such positions. Responsibilities of such positions shall be clearly defined in a job description.

Responsibilities of school counselors include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Engaging with, advocating for, and providing all students with direct services, such as individual counseling, group counseling, risk assessment, crisis response, and instructional services, including mental health and behavioral, academic, and postsecondary educational services and indirect services, including but not limited to, positive school climate strategies, teacher and parent consultations, and referrals to public and private community services
- 2. Planning, implementing, and evaluating school counseling programs
- 3. Working within a MTSS that uses multiple data sources to monitor and improve student behavior, attendance, engagement, and achievement
- 4. Developing, coordinating, and supervising comprehensive student support systems in collaboration with teachers, administrators, other pupil personnel services professionals, families, community partners, and community agencies, including county mental health agencies
- 5. Promoting and maintaining a safe learning environment for all students by providing restorative practices, positive behavior interventions, and support services, and by developing a variety of intervention strategies, and using those strategies, to meet individual, group, and school community needs before, during, and after a crisis
- 6. Intervening to ameliorate school-related problems, including problems related to chronic absences and retention

- 7. Using research-based strategies to promote mental wellness, reduce mental health stigma, and to identify characteristics, risk factors, and warning signs of students who develop, or are at risk of developing, mental health and behavioral disorders and who experience, or are at risk of experiencing, mistreatment, including mistreatment related to any form of conflict or bullying
- 8. Improving school climate and student well-being by addressing the mental and behavioral health needs of students during a period of transition, separation, heightened stress, and critical changes, accessing community programs and services to meet those needs, and providing other appropriate services
- 9. Enhancing students' social and emotional competence, character, health, civic engagement, cultural literacy, and commitment to lifelong learning and the pursuit of high-quality educational program
- 10. Providing counseling services for unduplicated students who are classified as English learners, or foster youth, homeless children, and students eligible for free and reduced-priced meals, including interventions and support services that enhance equity and access to appropriate education systems and public and private services
- 11. Engaging in continued development as a professional school counselor

Educational and Career Counseling

Beginning in grade 7, parents/guardians shall receive a general notice at least once before career counseling and course selection so that they may participate in the counseling sessions and decisions. (Education Code 221.5)

The educational counseling program may include academic counseling, in the following areas (Education Code 49600):

- 1. Development and implementation, with parent/guardian involvement, of the student's immediate and long-range educational plans
- 2. Optimizing progress towards achievement of proficiency standards and competencies
- 3. Completion of the required curriculum in accordance with the student's needs, abilities, interests, and aptitudes
- 4. High-quality career programs at all grade levels in which students are assisted in doing all of the following:
 - a. Planning for the future, including, but not limited to, identifying personal interests, skills, and abilities, career planning, course selection, and career transition
 - b. Becoming aware of personal preferences and interests that influence educational and occupational exploration, career choice, and career success
 - c. Developing work self-efficacy for the ever-changing work environment, the changing needs of the workforce, and the effects of work on quality of life
 - d. Understanding the relationship between academic achievement and career success, and the importance of maximizing career options
 - e. Understanding the value of participating in career technical education pathways, programs, and certifications, including, but not limited to, those related to regional occupational programs and centers, the federal program

administered by the United States Department of Labor offering free education and vocational training to students, known as "Job Corps," the California Conservation Corps, work-based learning, industry certifications, college preparation and credit, and employment opportunities

- f. Understanding the need to develop essential employable skills and work habit
- g. Understanding entrance requirements to the Armed Forces of the United States, including the benefits of the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test

The district's educational counseling program also may include, but not be limited to, identification of students who are at risk of not graduating with their peers, development of a list of coursework and experience necessary to assist students to satisfy the curricular requirements for college admission and successfully transition to postsecondary education or employment, and counseling regarding available options for students who fail to meet graduation requirements to continue with their education. The Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a program of guidance, placement, and follow-up for all high school students subject to compulsory continuation education. (Education Code 48431)

As part of the district's educational counseling program, students may be offered mental and behavioral health services under which a student may receive prevention, intervention, short-term counseling services, and mental health related classroom instruction to reduce stigma and increase awareness of counseling support services.

No counselor shall unlawfully discriminate against any student. Guidance counseling regarding school programs and career, vocational, or higher education opportunities shall not be differentiated on the basis of any protected category specified in BP 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities.

In addition, counselors shall affirmatively explore with a student the possibility of careers, or courses leading to careers, that are nontraditional for that student's sex. (Education Code 221.5)

For assessing or counseling students, the district shall not use testing or other materials that permit or require impermissible or unlawful differential treatment of students. (5 CCR 4931)

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall not have access to students for recruiting purposes. (Education Code 49603; 10 USC 503)

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with businesses, government agencies, postsecondary institutions including universities and career technical schools, community organizations, and/or other employers to provide students with actual or simulated work-based learning opportunities through college and/or career fairs.

When planning to hold a college or career fair, the Superintendent or designee shall notify each apprenticeship program in the county. The notification shall include the planned date, time and location of the college or career fair. (Labor Code 3074.2)

Personal or Mental Health Counseling

A school counselor, school psychologist, or school social worker may provide individualized personal, mental health, or family counseling to students in accordance with the specialization(s) authorized by their credential. Such services may include, but are not limited to, support related to the student's social and emotional development, behavior, substance abuse, mental health assessment, depression, or mental illness. As appropriate, students and their parents/guardians shall be informed about community agencies, organizations, or health care providers that offer qualified professional assistance.

Written parent/guardian consent shall be obtained before mental health counseling or treatment services are provided to a student, except when the student is authorized to consent to the service pursuant to Family Code 6920-6929, Health and Safety Code 124260, or other applicable law.

Any information of a personal nature disclosed to a school counselor by a student age 12 years or older or by the student's parent/guardian is confidential and shall not become part of the student record without the written consent of the person who disclosed the confidential information. The information shall not be revealed, released, discussed, or referred to except under the limited circumstances specified in Education Code 49602. (Education Code 49602)

A counselor shall consult with the Superintendent or designee and, as appropriate, with the district's legal counsel whenever unsure of how to respond to a student's personal problem or when questions arise regarding the possible release of confidential information regarding a student.

Crisis Counseling

The Board recognizes the need for a prompt and effective response when students are confronted with a traumatic incident. School counselors shall assist in the development of the comprehensive school safety plan, emergency and disaster preparedness plan, and other prevention and intervention practices designed to assist students and parents/guardians before, during, and after a crisis.

Early identification and intervention plans shall be developed to help identify those students who may be at risk for violence so that support may be provided before they engage in violent or disruptive behavior.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall identify crisis counseling resources to train district staff in effective threat assessment, appropriate response techniques, and/or methods to directly help students cope with a crisis if it occurs.

Teacher-Based Advisory Program

The Board recognizes that a supportive, ongoing relationship with a caring adult can provide a student with valuable advice, enhance student-teacher relationships, and build the student's feelings of connectedness with the school. receive related information and training, and be subject to this Board policy and law, including requirements pertaining to student confidentiality and nondiscrimination.

Business and Noninstructional Operations

TRANSPORTATION

The Governing Board desires to provide for the safe and efficient transportation of students to and from school as necessary to ensure student access to the educational program, promote regular attendance and reduce tardiness. In determining the extent to which the district provides for transportation services the Board shall depend upon weigh student and community needs and a continuing assessment of financial resources against the cost of providing such services.

The Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board the most economical, environmentally sustainable, and appropriate means of providing transportation services. The district's transportation services may be provided by means of a joint powers agreement, a cooperative student transportation program, or a consortium, as permitted by law.

No student shall be required to be transported for any reason without the written permission of the student's parent/guardian, except in emergency situations involving illness or injury to the student pursuant to Education Code 35350 or the evacuation of students as necessary for their safety.

Transportation Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a transportation plan in consultation with classified staff, teachers, school administrators, regional local transit authorities, local air pollution control districts and air quality management districts, parents/guardians, students, and other stakeholders. (Education Code 39800.1)

The transportation plan shall be presented to and adopted by the Board at an open meeting, with the opportunity for in-person and remote public comment, and shall be updated annually by April 1. (Education Code 39800.1)

The transportation plan shall include descriptions of the following: (Education Code 39800.1)

- 1. The transportation services offered to students
- 2. How transportation services will be prioritized for low-income students, students in transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and any of grades 1 to 6, inclusive

- 3. The transportation services accessible to students with disabilities and homeless children and youth, as defined pursuant to the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC 11301)
- 4. How unduplicated students, as defined in Education Code 42238.02, will be able to access available home-to-school transportation at no cost

Transportation Contracts

The Board may purchase, rent, or lease vehicles; contract with a common carrier or municipally owned transit system; contract with responsible private parties including the parent/guardian of the student being transported; and/or contract with the County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 35330, 39800, 39801) In contracting for transportation services, the district shall comply with all applicable laws related to bids and contracts. (Education Code 39802-39803)

Expenses and Fees

In lieu of providing transportation in whole or in part, the district may pay the student's parents/guardians either their actual and necessary expenses in transporting the student or the cost of the student's food and lodging at a place convenient to the school. In either case, the amount of the payment shall not exceed the cost that would be incurred by the district to provide for the transportation of the student to and from school. (Education Code 39806-39807)

The Board may charge a transportation fee to parents/guardians of transported students in accordance with Education Code 39807.5 and BP/AR 3250 - Transportation Fees.

Safety and Monitoring

The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to promote safety for students traveling on school buses.

The district may install a global positioning system (GPS) on school buses and/or student activity buses in order to enhance student safety and provide real-time location data to district and school administrators, and parents/guardians.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure the qualifications of bus drivers and related staff employed by the district, provide for the maintenance and operation of district-owned school buses and other equipment, and ensure adequate facilities for equipment storage and maintenance.

Classified Personnel BP 4216

PROBATIONARY/PERMANENT STATUS

The Governing Board desires to employ and retain highly qualified classified personnel to support the district's educational program and operations. Newly hired classified employees shall serve a probationary period during which the Board shall determine their suitability for long-term district employment.

Employees newly hired for regular positions in the classified service shall be considered probationary employees until they have satisfactorily completed one year of probationary service. Upon satisfactorily completing this period, they shall become permanent classified employees of the district.

A probationary employee who has been employed by the district for six months or 130 days of paid service, whichever is longer, can be classified as a permanent employee of the district. (Education Code 45113, 45301)

(cf. 4215 - Evaluation/Supervision)

However, in order to receive permanent classified service status, a full-time district police officer or public safety dispatcher who operates a dispatch center certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training shall serve in a probationary status for not less than one year from the date of appointment. (Education Code 45113, 45301)

Probationary employees shall receive written performance evaluations by their supervisor during the probationary period. These evaluations shall indicate whether the evaluator is satisfied or not satisfied with the employee's ability, performance, and compatibility with the job.

The Superintendent or designee district may dismiss an new employee during the initial probationary period.

(cf. 4218 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)

Permanent employees promoted to a higher classification shall be considered probationary in their new position until they have satisfactorily completed one year of service in that position the probationary period.

A permanent employee who accepts a promotion and fails to complete the probationary period for that promotional position shall be employed in the classification from which he/she was promoted. (Education Code 45113, 45301)

This policy shall be made available to classified employees and the public. (Education Code 45113)

Absence from school shall be excused only for health reasons, family emergencies, and justifiable personal reasons, as permitted by law, Board policy, and administrative regulations. (Education Code 48205)

Student absence for religious instruction or participation in religious exercises away from school property may be considered excused subject to law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 46014)

Inasmuch as school attendance and class participation are integral to students' learning experiences, parents/guardians and students shall be encouraged to schedule medical and other appointments during non-school hours.

Students shall not be absent from school without their parents/guardians' knowledge or consent, except in cases of medical emergency or, as authorized pursuant to Education Code 46010.1, for a confidential medical appointment.

IDENTIFICATION AND EVALUATION OF INDIVIDUALS FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Governing Board recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate district residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with state and federal law.

IDENTIFICATION AND EVALUATION OF INDIVIDUALS FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

Referrals for Special Education Services

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's child find process includes the collection of data and, at reasonable intervals, the screening of such data to determine if students are making adequate progress, as appropriate.

A student shall be referred for special education instruction and services only after the resources of the regular education program have been considered and used where appropriate. (Education Code 56303)

However, the district shall ensure that evaluations of children suspected of having a disability are not delayed or denied because of the implementation of response to intervention strategies.

A parent/guardian or the district may initiate a request for an initial evaluation to determine if the student is a student with a disability. (34 CFR 300.301)

When a verbal referral is made, staff shall offer assistance to the individual to make the request in writing and shall assist the individual if the individual requests such assistance. (5 CCR 3021)

All referrals from school staff for an initial evaluation shall include a brief reason for the referral and description of the regular program resources that were considered and/or modified for use with the student-and, when appropriate, the results of intervention. This documentation shall not delay the timelines for completing the assessment plan or assessment. (5 CCR 3021)

Initial Evaluation for Special Education Services

Before the initial provision of special education and related services to a student with a disability, the district shall conduct a full and an individual initial evaluation of the student's educational needs related to all areas of suspected disability. (Education Code 56320; 34 CFR 300.301)

Upon receipt of a referral of any student for special education and related services, a proposed evaluation plan shall be developed within 15 calendar days, not counting days between the student's regular school sessions or terms or calendar days of school vacation in excess of five school days, unless the parent/guardian agrees, in writing, to an extension. If the referral is made within 10 days or less prior to the end of the student's regular school year or term, the proposed evaluation plan shall be developed within 10 days after the beginning of the next regular school year or term. (Education Code 56043, 56321)

The proposed evaluation plan shall meet all of the following requirements: (Education Code 56321)

- 1. Be in a language easily understood by the general public
- 2. Be provided in the native language of the parent/guardian or other mode of communication used by the parent/guardian unless it is clearly not feasible
- 3. Explain the types of evaluation to be conducted
- 4. State that no individualized education program (IEP) will result from the evaluation without parent/guardian consent

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program)

A copy of the notice of a parent/guardian's rights and procedural safeguards shall be attached to the evaluation plan. (Education Code 56321)

The proposed written evaluation plan shall include a description of recent assessments conducted, including available independent assessments and assessment information requested by the parent/guardian to be considered, as well as information indicating the student's primary language and the student's primary language proficiency as determined by Education Code section 52164.1. (5 CCR 3022)

Before conducting an initial evaluation, the district shall provide the parent/guardian with prior written notice in accordance with 34 CFR 300.503. In addition, as part of the evaluation plan, the parent/guardian shall receive written notice that includes all of the following information: (Education Code 56329; 34 CFR 300.304, 300.502, 300.504)

- 1. Upon completion of the administration of tests and other evaluation materials, an IEP team meeting that includes the parent/guardian or his/her representative shall be scheduled pursuant to Education Code 56341. At this meeting, the team shall determine whether or not the student is a student with disabilities, as defined in Education Code 56026, and shall discuss the evaluation, the educational recommendations, and the reasons for the recommendations.
- 2. When making a determination of eligibility for special education, the district shall not determine that the student is disabled if the primary factor for such determination is lack of appropriate instruction in reading, including the essential components of reading instruction as defined in 20 USC 6368, lack of appropriate instruction in mathematics, or limited English proficiency, if the student does not otherwise meet the eligibility criteria under 34 CFR 300.8.
- 3. A copy of the evaluation report and the documentation of determination of eligibility shall be given to the parent/guardian.
- 4. If the parent/guardian disagrees with an evaluation obtained by the district, he/she has the right to obtain, at public expense, an independent educational evaluation (IEE) of the student from qualified specialists, in accordance with 34 CFR 300.502. The

parent/guardian is entitled to only one such evaluation at public expense each time the district conducts an assessment with which the parent/guardian disagrees.

If the district observed the student in conducting its evaluation, or if its evaluation procedures make it permissible to have in-class observation of the student, an equivalent opportunity shall apply to the IEE. This equivalent opportunity shall apply to the student's current placement and setting as well as observation of the district's proposed placement and setting, if any, regardless of whether the IEE is initiated before or after the filing of a due process hearing proceeding.

5. The district may initiate a due process hearing pursuant to Education Code 56500-56508 to show that its evaluation is appropriate. If the final decision resulting from the due process hearing is that the evaluation is appropriate, the parent/guardian maintains the right for an IEE, but not at public expense.

If the parent/guardian obtains an IEE at private expense, the results of the IEE shall be considered by the district with respect to the provision of a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to the student, and may be presented as evidence at a due process hearing regarding the student. If the district observed the student in conducting its evaluation, or if its evaluation procedures make it permissible to have in-class observation of a student, an equivalent opportunity shall apply to an IEE of the student in the student's current educational placement and setting and in any educational placement and setting proposed by the district, regardless of whether the IEE is initiated before or after the filing of a due process hearing.

6. If the parent/guardian proposes a publicly financed placement of the student in a nonpublic school, the district shall have an opportunity to observe the proposed placement and, if the student has already been unilaterally placed in the nonpublic school by his/her parent/guardian, the student in that proposed placement. Any such observation shall only be of the student who is the subject of the observation and shall not include the observation or evaluation of any other student in the proposed placement unless that other student's parent/guardian consents to the observation or evaluation. The results of any observation or evaluation of another student in violation of Education Code 56329(d) shall be inadmissible in any due process or judicial proceeding regarding FAPE of that other student.

Parent/Guardian Consent for Evaluations

Upon receiving the proposed evaluation plan, the parent/guardian shall have at least 15 days to decide whether or not to consent to the initial evaluation. The district shall not interpret parent/guardian consent for initial evaluation as consent for initial placement or initial provision of special education services. (Education Code 56321; 34 CFR 300.300)

Informed parental Consent means that the parent/guardian: (Education Code 56021.1; 34 CFR 300.9)

- 1. Has been fully informed, in his/her native language or other mode of communication, of all information relevant to the activity for which consent is sought
- 2. Understands and agrees, in writing, to the carrying out of the activity for which his/her consent is sought and the consent describes that activity and lists the records (if any) that will be released and to whom
- 3. Understands that the granting of consent is voluntary on his/her part and may be revoked at any time
- 4. Understands that if he/she revokes consent, that revocation is not retroactive (i.e., it does not negate an action that has occurred after the consent was given and before the consent was revoked). The district is not required to amend the education records of a student to remove any reference to the student's receipt of special education and services if the student's parent/guardian submits a written revocation of consent after the initial provision of special education and related services to the student.

The district shall make reasonable efforts to obtain the informed Upon receiving the proposed evaluation plan, the parent/guardian shall have at least 15 days to decide whether to consent to the initial evaluation. The district shall not interpret parent/guardian consent for initial evaluation as consent for initial placement or initial provision of special education services consent of the parent/guardian for an initial evaluation or reevaluation of a student. (Education Code 56321; 34 CFR 300.300, 300.322)

The district shall make reasonable efforts to obtain the consent of the parent/guardian for an initial evaluation or reevaluation of a student. (Education Code 56321; 34 CFR 300.300, 300.322)

The district shall maintain a record of its attempts to obtain consent, which may include such as: (Education Code 56342.5)

- 1. Detailed records of telephone calls made or attempted and the results of those calls
- 2. Copies of correspondence sent to the parent/guardian and any responses received
- 3. Detailed records of visits made to the parent/guardian's home or place of employment and the results of those visits

If a parent/guardian refuses to consent to the initial evaluation or fails to respond to a request to provide consent, the district may, but is not required to, pursue an evaluation by utilizing the procedural safeguards, including the mediation and due process procedures pursuant to 20 USC 1415 and 34 CFR 300.506-300.516. (Education Code 56321; 34 CFR 300.300)

For a student who is a ward of the state and not residing with the student's parent/guardian, the district shall make reasonable efforts to obtain the informed consent from the parent/guardian of the student for an initial evaluation to determine whether the student is a student with a disability. The district may conduct an initial evaluation without obtaining informed consent if any of the following situations exists: (Education Code 56321.1; 20 USC 1414; 34 CFR 300.300)

- 1. Despite reasonable efforts to do so, the district cannot discover the whereabouts of the parent/guardian of the student.
- 2. The rights of the parent/guardian of the student have been terminated in accordance with state law.
- 3. The rights of the parent/guardian to make educational decisions have been subrogated by a judge in accordance with state law and consent for an initial evaluation has been given by an individual appointed by the judge to represent the student.

(cf. 6159.3 - Appointment of Surrogate Parent for Special Education Students)

The district need not obtain parent/guardian consent before reviewing existing data as part of an evaluation or reevaluation, or before administering a test or other evaluation that is administered to all students, unless consent is required from the parents/guardians of all students. (Education Code 56321; 34 CFR 300.300)

Conduct of the Evaluation

Within 60 calendar days of receiving parental consent for the initial assessment of a student, not counting days between the student's regular school sessions, terms, or days of school vacation in excess of five schooldays, a determination whether the student is eligible for special education and the educational needs of the student shall be made, an IEP team meeting shall occur, and an IEP shall be developed, unless the parent/guardian agrees in writing to an extension, pursuant to Education Code 56344. If the 60-day time is interrupted by a student school vacation, the 60-day time shall recommence on the date that student schooldays reconvene and a meeting to develop an IEP for the student shall be conducted within 30 days of a determination that the student needs special education and related services. (Education Code 56043, 56344)

However, when a referral has been made for a student 30 days or less prior to the end of the regular school year, an IEP required as a result of an assessment of the student shall be developed within 30 days after the commencement of the subsequent regular school year. (Education Code 56043, 56344; 34 CFR 300.301, 300.323)

The evaluation shall be conducted by qualified personnel who are competent to perform the assessment as determined by the district. (Education Code 56320, 56322)

In addition, evaluations and reevaluations shall be administered by qualified personnel who are competent in the oral or sign language skills and written skills of the student's primary language or mode of communication and have a knowledge and understanding of the cultural and ethnic background of the student. If it is clearly not feasible to do so, an interpreter shall be used, and the assessment report shall document this condition and note that the validity of the assessment may have been affected. The normal process of second-language acquisition, as well as manifestations of dialect and sociolinguistic variance shall not be diagnosed as a disabling condition. (5 CCR 3023)

The screening of a student by a teacher or specialist to determine appropriate instructional strategies for curriculum implementation shall not be considered to be an evaluation for eligibility for special education and related services. (Education Code 56321; 20 USC 1414; 34 CFR 300.302)

In conducting the evaluation, the district shall use a variety of assessment tools and strategies to gather relevant functional, developmental, and academic information about the student. The district shall also use any information provided by the parent/guardian that may assist the district in making the determination as to whether the student is a student with a disability and, if so, the necessary components of his/her IEP when the IEP is developed, including information related to enabling the student to be involved in and to progress in the general education curriculum. (34 CFR 300.304)

The district's evaluation shall not use any single measure or assessment as the sole criterion for determining whether a student is a student with a disability and for determining the appropriate educational program for the student. The assessment shall use technically sound instruments that may assess the relative contribution of cognitive and behavioral factors in addition to physical or developmental factors. (**Education Code 56320**; 34 CFR 300.304)

The district shall also ensure that assessments and other evaluation materials provide relevant information that assists in determining the student's educational needs and are: (Education Code 56320; 34 CFR 300.304)

- 1. Selected and administered so as not to be discriminatory on a racial, cultural, or sexual basis
- 2. Provided and administered in the student's native language or other mode of communication and in the form most likely to yield accurate information on what the student knows and can do academically, developmentally, and functionally, unless it is clearly not feasible to so provide or administer
- 3. Used for the purposes for which the assessments or measures are valid and reliable
- 4. Administered by trained and knowledgeable personnel except that individually administered tests of intellectual or emotional functioning shall be administered by a credentialed school psychologist
- 5. Administered in accordance with any instructions provided by the producer of the assessments
- 6. Tailored to assess specific areas of educational need and not merely designed to provide a single general intelligence quotient
- 7. If administered to a student with impaired sensory, manual, or speaking skills, selected and administered to best ensure that the results accurately reflect the student's aptitude or achievement level or whatever other factors the test purports to measure, rather than reflecting the child's impaired sensory, manual, or speaking skills (unless those skills are the factors that the test purports to measure).

Students shall be assessed in all areas related to the suspected disability, including, if appropriate, health and development, vision (including low vision), hearing, motor abilities, language function, general intelligence, academic performance, communicative status, self-help, orientation and mobility skills, career and vocational abilities and interests, and social

and emotional status. When appropriate, a developmental history shall be obtained. For students with residual vision, a low vision assessment shall be provided in accordance with guidelines established pursuant to Education Code 56136. The district shall ensure that the evaluation is sufficiently comprehensive to identify all of the student's special education and related service needs, whether or not commonly linked to the disability category in which the student has been classified. (Education Code 56320; 34 CFR 300.304)

As part of the initial evaluation and any reevaluation, the IEP team and other qualified professionals shall, if appropriate, review existing evaluation data on the student, including evaluations and information provided by the parents/guardians, current classroom-based local or state assessments and classroom-based observations, and observations by teachers and related services providers. On the basis of that review and input from the student's parent/guardian, the team shall identify what additional data, if any, are needed to determine: (Education Code 56381; 34 CFR 300.305)

- 1. Whether the student is a student with a disability, or in the case of a reevaluation, whether the student continues to have a disability, and the educational needs of the student
- 2. The present levels of academic achievement and related developmental needs of the student
- 3. Whether the student needs, or continues to need, special education and related services
- 4. Whether any additions or modifications to the special education and related services are needed to enable the student to meet the measurable annual goals set out in his/her IEP and to participate, as appropriate, in the general education curriculum

If a student has transferred from another district in the same school year or leaves this district, the district shall coordinate with the student's prior or subsequent district as necessary and as expeditiously as possible to ensure prompt completion of full evaluations. (**Education Code 56320**; 34 CFR 300.304)

Evaluation Report

The personnel who evaluate the student shall prepare a written report of the results of each evaluation. The report shall include, but not be limited to, the following: (Education Code 56327)

- 1. Whether the student may need special education and related services
- 2. The basis for making the determination
- 3. The relevant behavior noted during the observation of the student in an appropriate setting
- 4. The relationship of that behavior to the student's academic and social functioning
- 5. The educationally relevant health, developmental, and medical findings, if any

- 6. For students with learning disabilities, whether there is such a discrepancy between achievement and ability that it cannot be corrected without special education and related services
- 7. A determination concerning the effects of environmental, cultural, or economic disadvantage, where appropriate
- 8. The need for specialized services, materials, and equipment for students with low incidence disabilities, consistent with Education Code 56136

Eligibility Determination

Upon completion of the administration of assessments and other evaluation measures, a group of qualified professionals and the parent/guardian shall determine whether the student is a student with a disability as defined in 5 CCR 3030 and 34 CFR 300.8 and, if so, his/her educational needs. In interpreting the data, the group shall draw information from a variety of sources, including aptitude and achievement tests, parent/guardian input, and teacher recommendations, as well as information about the student's physical condition, social or cultural background, and adaptive behavior. The group shall ensure that the information obtained from these sources is documented and carefully considered. (34 CFR 300.306)

When making a determination of eligibility for special education and related services, the district shall not determine that a student is disabled if the primary factor for such determination is a lack of appropriate instruction in reading, including the essential components of reading instruction pursuant to 20 USC 6368, lack of instruction in mathematics, limited English proficiency, or that the student does not otherwise meet the eligibility criteria. (Education Code 56329; 34 CFR 300.306)

The normal process of second-language acquisition, as well as manifestations of dialect and sociolinguistic variance, shall not be diagnosed as a disabling condition. (5 CCR 3023)

Independent Educational Evaluation

An *independent educational evaluation* is defined as an evaluation conducted by a qualified examiner who is not employed by the district. (34 CFR 300.502)

Public expense means that the district either pays for the full cost of the IEE or ensures that the evaluation is otherwise provided at no cost to the parent/guardian. (34 CFR 300.502)

The parents/guardians of a student with a disability have the right to obtain an IEE at public expense under the same criteria, including the location of the evaluation and the qualifications of the examiner, that the district uses for a district-initiated evaluation. (34 CFR 300.502)

The parent/guardian is entitled to only one IEE at public expense each time the district conducts an evaluation with which the parent/guardian disagrees. (Education Code 56329; 34 CFR 300.502)

If a parent/guardian has requested an IEE, the district may ask for the reason that the parent/guardian objects to the district's evaluation. However, the parent/guardian is not required to provide an explanation and the district may not unreasonably delay either providing the IEE at public expense or filing a due process complaint to request a due process hearing to defend the public evaluation. (34 CFR 300.502)

Upon receiving the request for an IEE, the district shall, without unnecessary delay, either: (34 CFR 300.502)

- 1. File a due process complaint to request a hearing to show that its evaluation is appropriate
- 2. Ensure that an IEE is provided at public expense, unless the district demonstrates at a hearing that the evaluation obtained by the parent/guardian did not satisfy the district's criteria

If a due process hearing decision determines that the district's evaluation is appropriate, then the parent/guardian may obtain an IEE but not at public expense. (Education Code 56329; 34 CFR 300.502)

In any decision made with respect to providing FAPE to a student with a disability, the result of any IEE obtained by the student's parent/guardian shall be considered by the district if it meets district criteria. Any such result also may be presented as evidence at a hearing on a due process complaint. (Education Code 56329; 34 CFR 300.502)

Coordinating Transitions

The district designates the individual listed below as the main point of contact for coordinating and completing, with other agencies and persons, the transition of a child and family from infant/toddler programs to preschool (Part C to Part B of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act), including establishing practices to educate and support families during the transition: (Government Code 95008)

Reevaluation

A reevaluation shall be conducted when the district determines that the educational or related service needs of the student, including improved academic achievement and functional performance, warrant a reevaluation or if the student's parent/guardian or teacher requests reevaluation. Such reevaluations shall occur every three years, unless the parent/guardian and district agree in writing that a reevaluation is unnecessary. A reevaluation may not occur more than once a year, unless the parent/guardian and the district agree otherwise. (Education Code 56043, 56381; 34 CFR 300.303)

The district shall ensure that any reevaluations of the student are conducted in accordance with the evaluation procedures pursuant to 34 CFR 300.304-300.311. (34 CFR 300.303)

Before entering kindergarten or first grade, as the case may be, children with disabilities who are in a preschool program shall be reevaluated to determine if they still need special education and services. IEP teams shall identify a means of monitoring the continued success of children who are determined to be eligible for less intensive special education programs. (Education Code 56445)

The district's point of contact for coordinating and completing the transition of a child and family from infant/toddler programs to preschool, may coordinate the reevaluation and monitoring as described above for kindergarten or first grade.

SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAMS

The Governing Board recognizes that an extended break from the instructional program may result in significant learning loss, especially among disadvantaged and low-achieving students, and desires to provide opportunities during the summer for students to practice essential skills, make academic progress, and develop social, emotional, and physical needs and interests through hands-on engaging learning experiences.

Summer programs offered by the district shall be aligned with the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP), other applicable district and school plans, and the educational program provided during the school year. When feasible, summer programs shall blend high-quality academic instruction in core curricular and/or elective subjects with recreation, nutrition programs, social and emotional development, and support services that encourage attendance, student engagement in learning, and student wellness.

Summer School

The Superintendent or designee, with Board approval, may establish summer school day and/or evening classes.

The district's summer school program may be used to provide supplemental instruction to students needing remediation and/or enrichment in core academic subjects.

As appropriate, priority for enrollment in summer school programs shall be given to district students who:

- 1. Need course credits in order to graduate from high school before the beginning of the next school year
- 2. Have been retained or are at risk of being retained at their grade level
- 3. Demonstrate academic deficiencies in core curriculum areas
- 4. Are in targeted student groups identified in the district's LCAP as needing increased or improved services to succeed in the educational program
- 5. Are in grades transitional kindergarten (TK)-6 and are required to be offered or provided access to Expanded Learning Opportunities Programs pursuant to Education Code 46120 and BP/AR 5184.2 Before/After School Programs

The remaining openings shall be offered to other district students on a first-come first-served basis.

Because summer courses cover extensive instructional content in a relatively short time period, students who have more than three excused absences or one unexcused absence

may not receive credit for summer session class(es) unless they make-up missed work in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Sites for summer school programs may be rotated in an effort to make summer school programs more accessible to all students, regardless of residence or regular attendance area, and to accommodate the maintenance needs of district schools.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on summer school enrollment in the current year and previous year for the program as a whole and disaggregated by grade level, school that the students attend during the regular school year, and student population. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may report on the extent to which students successfully achieved the outcomes established for the program.

Additional Summer Learning Opportunities

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with parents/guardians, city and county agencies, community organizations, child care providers, and/or other interested persons to develop, implement, and build awareness of organized activities that support summer learning.

Strategies to support summer learning may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Providing information to students and parents/guardians about summer reading programs scheduled to be conducted by public libraries or community organizations
- 2. Collaborating with the local parks and recreation agency and/or community organizations to provide day camps, sports programs, or other opportunities for physical education and activity
- 3. Collaborating with workforce development agencies, businesses, and community organizations to provide summer job training opportunities that include an academic component
- 4. Encouraging reading in the home, such as providing lists of recommended reading to students and parents/guardians, establishing a target number of books or pages, and providing prizes for achievement of reading goals
- 5. Assigning summer vacation homework in core curricular subject(s) for extra credit
- 6. Conducting occasional, interactive "fun days" during the summer to provide activities related to art, music, science, technology, mathematics, environmental science, multicultural education, debate, or other subject
- 7. Arranging opportunities for community service

These references are not intended to be part of the policy itself, nor do they indicate the basis or authority for the board to enact this policy. Instead, they are provided as additional resources for those interested in the subject matter of the policy.

SUBJECT: Professional Services Contract-Real Estate Utilization Strategy (REUS)

DISCUSSION/ACTION:

Along with Approval of the Real Estate Utilization Strategy-Professional Services Contract (PSA) [AGENDA ITEM____] we recommend the following action:

That the Board form an Ad Hoc Board Real Estate Utilization Strategy (REUS) Sub-Committee consisting of President Andrew Hayes & Trustee Lara Hoefer Moir to work with District staff and the Consultant for the purpose of:

- 1. Ensuring that the Consultant meets the goals and objectives of the BOE and,
- 2. Ensuring that key stakeholders are identified, and community input and public participation is outlined in the consultant's report.

Background:

On April 20, 2023, the Board of Education unanimously took the following action:

Direct the Superintendent to retain Scott Barnett, and/or his associated companies, (the "Consultant"), utilizing a Professional Services Contract, for the purpose of developing a proposed real estate utilization strategy and proposed process for the use of underutilized and/or excess LUSD-owned properties.

Consultant should return with a draft report within 45 days of issuance of the Professional Services Contract.

Contract should not exceed \$25,000.

Develop a Real Estate Utilization Strategy

The Board's direction envisioned that the Consultant would return with a "ROADMAP" outlining a real estate strategy for underutilized and/or excess properties in the LUSD portfolio which could:

- Create partnerships with the private and non-profit sector to "leverage" the value of the land.
- Generate ongoing and long-term lease revenues which LUSD could use for a variety of educational purposes.
- Construct new and upgraded educational facilities such as classrooms, CTE workshops, science labs, and a variety of other uses, at no cost to the taxpayers. In many instances these facilities can also serve broader community needs including ball fields, meeting rooms, public safety facilities, etc.
- Provide for community needs such as "workforce" housing for educators.
- Lack of available space is often a major constraint on non-profits and other governmental entities' abilities to supply services such as day care and afterschool programs. New facilities can also be used as meeting rooms under the Civic Center Act for service clubs, community organizations, religious gatherings, veterans' organizations, businesses groups, charitable organizations, etc.

The above are just examples and are not intended to presuppose any specific use.

It was also expected that the Consultant should:

- Prioritize options that will allow LUSD to maintain ownership of its properties.
- Include options for maximizing public involvement, including experts from different disciplines.
- Propose methods for both cost recovery of LUSD upfront funding-including this contractand potential sources of ongoing non-district revenues to implement the proposed review and project approval process.
- Include a detailed budget, timeline and delineate proposed consultants, legal counsel, and key disciplines of individuals/firms who are experienced in school district property utilization issues.
